

Asset-Building Ideas for Libraries

Libraries and those who work in them can do more than nurture asset 25: Reading for Pleasure. In fact, libraries have tremendous potential to make a difference in the lives of young people. By giving young people access to books, computers, classes, and caring adults, libraries can open up a world of asset-building possibilities. Here are some ideas for what libraries can do to build assets:

- ◆ Use the asset framework as a guide when setting organizational priorities and goals.
- ◆ Create displays that promote asset building in general or your community's specific asset-building initiative. Post the list of assets in high-traffic areas of the library.
- If your community has an asset-building initiative, offer the library as meeting space for leadership teams, special committees, or other groups.
- Train librarians, support staff, and volunteers to understand their role as asset builders.
- ◆ Design bookmarks with asset-building messages to distribute to patrons.
- Display artwork, inventions, and other projects of children and youth in your library. Publicize the display in your community newspaper.
- ◆ Develop planning and decision-making roles for young people, such as including them on the library's board or creating a teen advisory group.
- **♦** Create library internships for youth.
- Distribute lists of books with assetbuilding themes.
- Hold community workshops on how to choose asset-building books, videos, and other materials.

- ◆ Offer workshops for parents on how important it is for children to read and be read to. Offer suggestions of specific books that might be appropriate for different age groups.
- ◆ Create book groups where people can come together to discuss books. Offer groups for children, teenagers, adults, and intergenerational groups.
- ◆ Invite local authors to speak about their writing and the role they think asset building has in the subjects they write about.
- ◆ Create a community book chain where each patron writes her or his favorite books on a piece of paper, and then link the pieces together to form a long chain in your library.
- ◆ Encourage reading by having a community-wide read-a-thon. Figure out ways to recognize participants in asset-building ways.
- Work with educators who are book lovers to develop asset-building reading programs and services.
- ◆ Find storytellers in your community and invite them to read, tell stories, or create dramatic presentations for children and youth.
- ◆ **Sponsor an event,** such as a poetry reading, planned by and offered to teenagers.
